Congratulations on your new position as General Service Representative (G.S.R.) for your group!

Through your service as a vital link with your home group, you allow the group's conscience to become part of "the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship," as expressed through the General Service Conference. The General Service Representatives (G.S.R.s) of the U.S. and Canada are the very foundation of our general service structure. As a G.S.R., you can make your group's voice heard at district meetings, at area assemblies, and eventually at the General Service Conference. You are linking your home group with the whole of A.A.

As part of your service commitment you will receive periodic mailings from G.S.O. to share with your home group on how your contributions are being used, A.A. items of interest, and a print version of our quarterly newsletter *Box 4-5-9*. We suggest that you share the contents of the G.S.O. newsletter with your group as it contains A.A. news and current A.A. experience on how members and groups handle various situations. The pamphlet "Self-Support: Where Money and Spirituality Mix" and the service pieces "The A.A. Group Treasurer" and "Self-Support Card" suggest ways your group can contribute to the support of A.A.
